Baby Needs Drive for the Island Pregnancy Centre



Once again this year, the Kirk will be collecting baby needs to assist at-risk mothers with their new babies. The Island Pregnancy Centre helps over 100 new mothers each year, so the need is great. The items we collect will go into gift bags that are

usually given to new mothers at their one month check-in, although items for older babies will be distributed during appropriate visits later. We are seeking gender neutral baby clothes for ages 3 months and older, baby blankets, hooded towels and wash cloths, toiletries, disposable diapers and baby wipes, thermometers, soothers, soft hair brushes, stuffies, board books and rattles. Each year our project receives a grant of \$1,000 from Synod Missions. This sum has already been received, and used to purchase items like diapers, toiletries, baby formula, bottles and gift cards. These items were delivered in January. Our collection will continue until Mother's Day, May 11th. A basket to collect donations will be placed at the Pownal entrance. Your support would be greatly appreciated.

PCC Mission Moment

Supported by Presbyterians Sharing and generous donations, a dedicated team brings the hope of Jesus to people in 24 prisons in Malawi. Overcrowding and underfunding means a lack of basic necessities. Stigma associated with imprisonment can result in abandonment by families and communities, leaving many feeling isolated and alone. Through weekly visits that include Bible study, prayer, and counselling, as well as monthly distribution of necessities such as bed mats, soap, toiletries, clothing, medicines and meal supplements for the most vulnerable, the Friends of Prisons ministry brings friendship and hope to prisoners.
